ROCIO GARCIA

Born in Mexico, Rocio Garcia moved to San Francisco, California, at the age of 14. Graduating high school in 2002, Garcia joined the California National Guard. In November 2002, she completed basic training in Fort Jackson, South Carolina. She completed advanced individual training and became a human resources specialist. Her responsibilities involved completing various administrative tasks, including promotions, awards and scheduling. In 2004, Garcia joined active duty.

Garcia's first duty assignment was in Germany, where she worked with the 37th Transportation

Group. Then, from 2005 to 2006, Garcia deployed to Camp Arifjan in Kuwait. Afterwards, she stayed in Germany for one year and re-enlisted. She then served in Cuba with the 525th Military Police Battalion from November 2007 to June 2008.

Around Christmas in 2009, she deployed to Iraq with the 66th Military Police Company. While in Baqubah, [Iraq](#), she experienced significant combat activity and frequent attacks. However, she worked on a small base and diligently performed her duties, such as delivering mail to soldiers.

Following Iraq, she traveled to the Netherlands in 2011 and worked with the Allied Forces North Battalion. It was around this time she was promoted to sergeant, which she considered to be one of her proudest moments in her Army career. Throughout her entire service, Garcia was also a single mother. After deciding to focus more on motherhood, Garcia discharged Jan. 2, 2013.

The first four years after leaving the Army were challenging. Her tenacity enabled her to overcome those challenges and she returned to school. She completed her associate degree in computer programming and web development, as well as a bachelor's degree in information technology. She is currently working towards a master's degree in cybersecurity, all while being a mother. Garcia said she is very grateful for her experience in the Army, as she came away with interpersonal skills that have helped her professionally and personally.

Help for Afghanistan Veterans and Families

This is a four-part series about Afghanistan Veterans and how they can get help through VA. The first part discusses how Veterans can reconcile their service. The second part of this series focuses on how those who served in Afghanistan can learn from those who served in Vietnam. The third part focuses on spouses and caregivers, who are often on the front lines of helping a Veteran deal with posttraumatic stress disorder, or PTSD. Finally, the fourth part of this series focuses on resources available for PTSD. While this series is focused on Afghanistan Veterans, options apply to all Veterans.

Part I Reconciling Service

“Our purpose for being there was to prevent further attacks on the homeland,” said [Senior Enlisted Advisor to the Chairman Ramón “CZ” Colón-López](#).

“We wanted to make sure that we denied Al Qaeda, specifically, of sanctuary, training ground and places where they could plan terrorism attacks. If you look at the past 20 years, that is exactly what we did. There hasn’t been a single attack on the homeland. They will think twice about doing it because of our actions over the past 20 years. For our Veterans, be proud of what you did, because you have kept the country safe over the last 20 years.”



Part II Learning From Vietnam Veterans



“I’ve got Vietnam Veterans who are still coming here, not because we failed to resolve any issue in their life, but because they found a home in the community,” said Joe Lasky, director of the Las Vegas Vet Center.

“They found friendships and a way to come talk and deal with issues that may have started in Vietnam, but now affect their current health. Because Vet Centers are readjustment counseling, that’s defined by every Veteran who comes in here.”

Part III Spouses and Caregivers Supporting Vietnam Veterans with PTSD



Senior Enlisted Advisor to the Chairman Ramón “CZ” Colón-López was one of those who deployed to Afghanistan. He battled PTSD for years before his wife, Janet, helped him realize he needed treatment. He said he’s proof that a spouse or caregiver can help a Veteran.

“Don’t let us get away with it,” he said. “Do what Janet did and push us to get help. Hell, drive us

to the damn clinic. Do yourself a favor and go ahead and make sure you seek the help that you need.”

Part IV Resources Available for PTSD

We don’t think twice about putting weapon systems in maintenance because we need them,” Colón-López said. “We run quality control checks on everything.

But the one decisive advantage we have as a U.S. military is the human weapon system. This is no different, so we need to make sure we take care of everything that we can right now as we draw down in Afghanistan. This is our depot maintenance period.”

VA CONSTRUCTION BILL ENACTED INTO LAW

A bill approved by Congress and signed by the President (Public Law 117-30) will authorize construction projects at VA medical facilities.

The *Major Medical Facility Authorization Act of 2021*, signed into law by President Joe Biden in July, will, according to a Senate VA Committee press release, authorize the following projects: 455 million for the closure and realignment of the Livermore Campus in Livermore, Calif.

- ❖ \$383 million for the community living center and outpatient facilities in Canandaigua, N.Y.
- ❖ \$367 million to the mental health and community living center in **Long Beach, Calif.**
- ❖ \$266 million for the outpatient clinic and national cemetery in Alameda, Calif.
- ❖ \$252 million to the spinal cord injury building with a community living center and parking garage in San Diego, Calif.
- ❖ \$249 million to the spinal cord injury center in Dallas, Texas.
- ❖ \$110 million for the specialty care building in American Lake, Was.

President Biden signed the bill July 29.

GULF WAR ILLNESSES LINKED TO AFGHANISTAN SERVICE



If you served in Afghanistan, you may suffer from illnesses or other conditions that we assume are related to service in this region. We call these presumptive diseases. Find out if you can get disability compensation or benefits.

Am I eligible for disability benefits from VA?

You may be eligible for disability benefits if you served in Afghanistan and didn't receive a dishonorable discharge. Your illness or condition must also meet the eligibility requirements listed below.

Both conditions must be true of your illness or condition. It:

- Started while you were on active duty or after September 19, 2001, **and**
- Resulted in a disability rating of 10% or more

And you must have received a diagnosis of one of the illnesses or conditions listed under one of the time periods below. Read the eligibility requirements related to time of diagnosis.

Eligibility Requirements. You can get disability benefits for your illness or condition if you have one of these presumptive diseases:

If your illness or condition was diagnosed within one year of your date of separation:	If your illness or condition was diagnosed at any time after your date of separation:

VFW-BACKED HOMELESS VETERANS BILL INTRODUCED IN SENATE

Building Solutions for Veterans experiencing Homeless Act of 2021, S. 2171

A bill that could permanently expand a program that helped homeless veterans through the COVID-19 pandemic was introduced to the Senate in July.

If passed and signed into law, the *Building Solutions for Veterans Experiencing Homeless Act of 2021, S. 2171*, would permanently expand VA's pandemic-relief resources to homeless veterans and their families. The bill would fund a five-year program providing grants to substance abuse recovery programs that aid homeless veterans and help them find jobs.

According to Senate VA Committee press release, the *Building Solutions for Veterans Experiencing Homeless Act* also would:

- Permanently allow funding for the construction of transitional housing for veterans experiencing homelessness.
- Provide organizations across the country with funding that would provide services to unhoused veterans.
- Allow VA to supply organizations with educational and support to best serve unhoused veterans.
- Expand public transportation for veterans to access mental health care, medical treatment, job services and other essential needs.

VFW National Legislative Director Pat Murray said that VFW supports the bill because it could help reduce veteran homelessness. "Eliminating roadblocks will help allow veterans to fully utilize the programs VA offers in order to maintain stable housing," Murray said.

MAMMOGRAM PILOT PROGRAM INTRODUCED IN SENATE



The *Making Advances in Mammography and Medical Options for Veterans Act, S 2533*, aims to improve cancer-preventative care for women who are enrolled in VA HEALTH CARE SYSTEM. If signed into law, the bill, also called the MAMMO for Veterans Act, would expand access to breast cancer screenings through a pilot program in areas where VA does not offer the service.

VFW National Legislative Services Deputy Director Tammy Barlet said that the VFW “strongly supports” the bill. “With a growing number of veterans seeking care, it’s imperative we expand access to quality mammography care and services in areas where they’re most needed,” Barlet said. “[The MAMMO for Veterans Act] is a necessary step in improving mammography care for veterans in rural areas across the country.”

The MAMMO FOR Veterans Act Also could require VA to upgrade to machines that produce 3D mammography, which may provide more accurate testing.

COVID-19 BOOSTER SHOTS AND ADDITIONAL DOSES



The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs follows the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidance on COVID-19 booster shots and additional vaccine doses.

THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN AN ADDITIONAL DOSE AND A BOOSTER SHOT

- **An additional dose** is for people who may not have had a strong enough immune response from the first 2 doses. [Learn about getting an additional dose / Web: www.cdc.gov](https://www.cdc.gov)

GETTING AN ADDITIONAL VACCINE DOSE

Who can get an additional vaccine dose?

The CDC now recommends a third vaccine dose for certain groups of people with weakened immune systems who received either the Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine. Data shows that these groups of people are more at risk of serious, long-term illness from COVID-19. They may benefit from a third dose to make sure they have enough protection against COVID-19.

GETTING A BOOSTER SHOT

Who should get a Pfizer-BioNTech booster shot?

The CDC recommends that these groups should get a booster shot if they completed their Pfizer-BioNTech primary vaccination series at least 6 months ago:

- People who are at least 65 years or old
- People who live in long-term care facilities
- People who are 50 to 64 years old and have an underlying medical condition [Check the CDC's list of underlying medical conditions / Web: https://www.cdc.gov/](#)

At this time, we can only provide Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 booster shots, based on CDC guidance. The FDA and CDC continue to review data to determine if they'll recommend booster shots for the Moderna and Janssen (Johnson & Johnson) COVID-19 vaccines. We must wait for guidance before we can provide booster shots for these other vaccines.
